Hurricane preparedness for travel trailer and mobile home residents

No travel trailer or mobile home – no matter how new – is a safe shelter from storm force wind

Before a Hurricane Threatens

Have emergency supplies on hand: Flashlight and portable battery-operated weather radio and extra batteries
• First-aid kit • Essential medicines • Three day supply of emergency food and water (with a non-electric can opener) • Cash and credit cards • Sturdy shoes and a change of clothing • Copies of important papers and valuables — bank statements, insurance records, deeds, prescriptions — in a waterproof container • Plan a safe evacuation route • Include pets in your plan • Fuel your vehicle

When a Hurricane Watch or Warning Is Issued

Relocate to a nearby safe structure • Secure all outside objects that could become flying objects • Stay tuned to a television or radio station for important weather updates • If you are an individual with disabilities and require assistance, let local emergency managers know about your needs

If Evacuation Is Ordered

Do not remove the FEMA travel trailer or mobile home

Listen to emergency officials for instructions • Quickly turn off propane tanks and main electrical power switch • Turn off main water valve and disconnect the hose • Remove all food items from the refrigerator • Gather your emergency supplies • Leave your travel trailer or mobile home • Avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges • Go to your pre-arranged place of safe shelter
